## LOW INFORMATION CHRISTIAN NO MORE

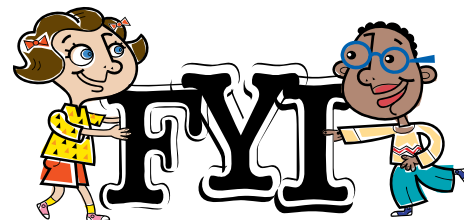
I've said it before: the truth matters. At no time is that more evident to me than Easter time. We believe that the tomb was empty—that Jesus of Nazareth was killed on Friday, laid in a borrowed grave Friday, Saturday, and arose early Sunday morning. We don't "have an opinion" on this. We aren't "putting a spin" on the facts. We believe that the historical evidence presented in the gospels and attested to by a wide variety of eyewitnesses is true. If it is not true, then we've got some serious explaining to do. If it is not true, our faith is in vain.

So you can understand why I am particularly defensive when lies, subterfuges, deceptions, and wild exaggerations are thrown out into the public square and left unchallenged.

This is particularly true in the last few years with the increasing reliance on cable television, Internet bloggers, forwarded emails, and talk radio. We are bombarded with information from a wide variety of people who are committed to one thing and one thing only—to grab your attention and keep your attention at all costs. The more people who tune into their show or click into their web

page, the more money they get from the advertisers who sponsor them. Of course juicing ad revenues with sensationalism is nothing new. What has changed is the medium—the means of communication, as well as the size of the checks getting written.

You don't have to tune in very long to begin to get a sense of how crazy things have gotten. Just last night, comedian John Stewart played a new clip about an Urologist in Florida who refused to treat patients who voted for our current President. He was irate about the current Health Care Reform Bill. When asked what specifically upset him, he replied that the legislation would eliminate hospice care



in 2012. It was explained to him that this wasn't and had never been part of the Bill. He was then asked where he got his information. The doctor hemmed and hawed and then said "online like everyone else." Stewart's response, "But this guy is a doctor!" In other words, he ought to know better than to believe everything he reads on the Internet.

Followers of Jesus Christ are called to be discerning, and the word "discern" has its roots in the old French, meaning to separate. In this case to separate what is

true from what is something less. For instance, the author of Proverbs tells us, "The discerning heart seeks knowledge, but the mouth of a fool feeds on folly." (15:14) Discernment isn't just about the easy work of separating irrefutable truth from intentional falsehood. More often than not it is a much more laborious chore of pulling out a kernel of truth from a whole pile of misleading innuendo, suspicion, and distortion.

The earliest Christians had no New Testament and very limited contact with the eyewitness apostles. They followed the leading of the Holy Spirit, letters written to them by Paul and others, and the word of God laid out in the Hebrew scriptures. There were lots of folks back then who tried to put their own spin on the gospel—some for their own profit, others to further their own agenda—and it took hard work to stay faithful. It wasn't easy then, and it isn't easy now.

Let's be very clear here. I'm not just talking about our national political debate. The Lord knows, there is plenty of misleading information being bandied about by all sides around every single important issue facing our country. The level of disdain and implied violence in our public discourse ought to give us all—no matter where we are on the political spectrum—serious pause.

But there are plenty of uninformed assertions around our crisis in educational funding, both in our

local schools and at Purdue. Distrust and fear get projected onto all parties: administrators and teachers, and those charged with finding savings in the system.

There are more and more people today making claims about what real Christians believe. I'll admit that a lot of the time it doesn't sound like what I believe, the implication being that I must be not much of a Christian.

And of course, the worst of all, there are the comments and observations about the personal lives and motivations of the people we come into contact with every day. My mom used to say, "Even if it is true, let gossip die with you: to pass it on is to keep it alive." I grew up believing that most gossip isn't true or that at best it is built on the smallest grain of truth.

I heard a phrase I'd never heard before the other day. Someone was referring to some of our fellow citizens as **Low Information Voters**. They were saying that some of us simply believe the last thing we heard or pay attention to the voice that shouts the loudest. Some of us evidently don't ever "test" the information given us. We keep the TV tuned to only one network; we read only one paper, bookmark and return to the same blogs—the one we're

predisposed to agree with. I confess there are plenty of times I would have to identify myself as a Low Information Voter. I don't always check my facts on *politi-fact.com*, or *factcheck.org*, or *snopes.com* (even though they're on my Internet home page). It's easier sometimes to believe what I want to believe without worrying about whether or not it is true.

Because telling the truth is so critical for those of us who follow Jesus and put our trust in his life, death, and resurrection, I am committing myself to never again be a **Low Information Christian**. I am going to develop the gift of discernment and use it whenever I can. I am going to guard a humble and teachable spirit which will allow me to give up what I want to be true for what is actually true. And I am going to try to ask more questions and offer fewer opinions. You can imagine, that for a preacher, it's not going to be easy.

## Introducing Our Newest Ministry—Swaddling Cloths

In the story of Christ's birth, the angel who appeared to the shepherds told them they would know the Christ who was born by a certain sign. Specifically, the angel said, "And this *will be* the sign to you: You will find a Babe wrapped in swaddling cloths, lying in a manger. (Luke 2:12, NKJV) This, of course, begs the question as to why WAS Jesus wrapped in swaddling cloths?

One theory suggests that the custom of the time was that when the son of a King was born, a prince, the baby

was washed in lightly salted water and then wrapped in swaddling cloths. Being "salted and swaddled" represented the commitment of the parents to God to raise the child to be honest and trustworthy; so that as a King, he would walk straight and tall among his people. In Jesus' case, Mary and Joseph swaddled Jesus indicating His royal lineage as the Son of God and heir to the throne.

Lucky for us, we too get to share in this royal lineage! As sons and daughters of

God, we are royal princes and princesses, set apart to do His work. And much like Mary and Joseph, St. Andrew wants to indicate this royal lineage as each baby is added to the St. Andrew family. And *Swaddling Cloths*, our newest ministry, will do just that. This ministry is resuming a tradition of giving each new child or grandchild of a St. Andrew parishioner a hand-knitted blanket to not only represent the love that this community of faith will wrap around him or her but also to represent the royalty

that the new baby is - a most precious and perfect child of God. If you have a new baby or grandbaby and haven't received a blanket, please let us know so we can present you with one; and if you have a baby or grandbaby on the way, please let us know so we can be ready!

## Walk to Jerusalem—an Overwhelming Success!

When we started our Lenten program, Walk to Jerusalem (WTJ), it may have seemed pretty far-fetched that St. Andrew would virtually walk all the way from W. Lafayette, Indiana to Jerusalem, Israel in the 5 ½ weeks between Ash Wednesday and Palm Sunday. Well, we not only made it to Jerusalem, but we went 2,470 miles more than we needed to walk. Yes. That's right. As a congregation, we "walked" a total of 8,713 miles!!! That's AMAZING! It is clear that both physical and spiritual health is important to this congregation! Approximately 125 people participated by submitting tally sheets at one point or another. Of those, 21 were children.

The adult who "walked" the most miles was Mike Jacobs and the child was Kristen Martin, and many others were not far behind. Julie Conlon, for example, was consistently over 100 miles every week! In conjunction with the WTJ, InTouch hosted a Rise and Shine Saturday event that allowed participants to experience different types of physical activity including karate, Pilates, aerobics and chair resistance training to name a few. And, we partnered with the Senior High Youth to sponsor a dance, Soul Train, which was a congregation-wide fundraising event for the senior high summer mission experience.

While many people re-

corded physical miles, spiritual miles added up as well. Participants recorded reading the Bible, daily devotions, or other Christian books. Some participated in Disciple Bible Study, the Daily Walk Bible Study and a Lenten Contemplative Bible Study held on Sunday mornings. Surely God was smiling as so many of us were focusing on his teachings. InTouch would like to thank all the people who helped make this program a huge success. Kudos to all who participated on their stellar accomplishment! A big thanks goes out to Van Neie who helped provide a mission focus for our bulletin inserts each week as we travelled through differ-

ent countries. Thanks to Taylor Honsowetz for making the weekly tally sheet available on our website. Also, our planning team - Melissa Martin, Dan and Jeni Leaird, Steve and Lisa Tally, Jan Collins-Cutter, Sue Burchill, and Kama Darr deserve our gratitude as they helped plan, tally, and promote this program. Finally, we would like to thank Pastor Tim and Pastor Pat for their overall support of the WTJ program and by preaching an exceptional companion sermon series entitled - *Making the Journey with Jesus*.

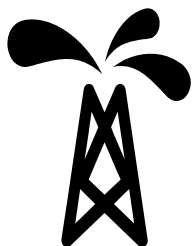
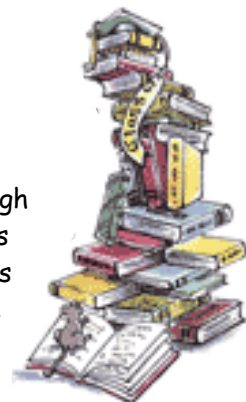

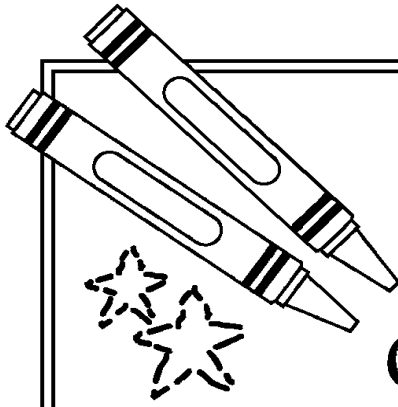


CareNotes Card Making - Monday, April 12 at 7:00 p.m. in the Intersection

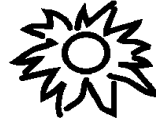
## ADMIN. SEC. TRAVELING
